“Doing Things Better: Improving Outcomes.”

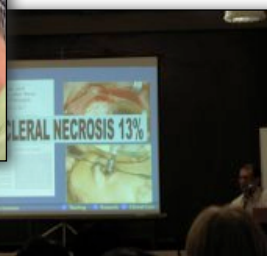

She also provided a number of useful and relevant website links.

Finally Professor Michael Collins from QUT gave a very informative and entertaining talk on Contact Lenses accompanied by wonderful slides.

Following lunch we held a forum where delegates posed questions and the panel and other delegates responded. We covered a broad range of topics and I am sure that for many it was both affirming and confronting to hear the responses. It certainly provided plenty of food for thought and improving evidence based practice. It was great to hear from our New Zealand colleagues and also from interstate colleagues. Notes on the forum were distributed to the participants. We then enjoyed a fabulous networking session sponsored by Alcon.
